

 - Are some of Chip's and Bo'sun Sanders' exact words included?
 - Are there at least two eyewitness accounts from spectators?
 - Does the article explain when and how the controversy over the ban will be resolved?
 - Does the reporter maintain an unbiased viewpoint?
 - Have any errors in spelling or punctuation been corrected?
 - Does a brief headline capture the reader's interest?

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
